Redesign Rupert: Initial Meetings

In order to provide an opportunity for traditional, non-traditional, and emerging community leaders to identify and talk about opportunities and challenges facing the community the Redesign Rupert project began with a number of initial one-to-one or small group meetings.

These meetings allowed the Community Development Institute (CDI) project team to take the pulse of the community and begin to build relationships with formal and informal leaders and opinion-makers. The meetings explored the assets and strengths that could be built on in the community and the relationships that exist between organizations. From this information, an understanding of the opportunities for and challenges impeding economic diversification and community resilience were developed.

Thirty-one meetings were held, involving 39 participants. The meetings were held October 2015-March 2016. Generally, meetings were held in the participant's office or at a community location such as a local coffee shop. Conversations typically lasted 45-60 minutes. A list of meeting participants can be found in Appendix 2A.

Meeting participants were asked to reflect on and share their thoughts on opportunities for economic growth and diversification and for building community resilience. The conversations were open ended and participants took the conversation in directions that were important and meaningful for them.

From these initial meetings, the following themes emerged with regard to opportunities for economic growth and diversification:

- Tourism: including eco-tourism, adventure tourism, regional tourism, and Aboriginal tourism.
- Downtown revitalization: including retail revitalization.
- Arts and culture: building on the existing artistic community, festivals, and events.
- Port expansion.
- Mobile workforces and visiting business people: especially those associated with LNG projects.
- LNG plant approval.

The themes that emerged with regard to opportunities for community resilience were:

- Engaging and supporting children and youth: especially pre-school programs (ages 0-5) and after school programs.
- Supporting families: especially single parents, residential school survivors, parents working away.
- Education: including encouraging high school graduation and post-secondary attendance.
- Housing: including housing for people travelling from First Nations communities to Prince Rupert and affordable housing for families and seniors.
- Providing support for and encouraging collaboration between social service providers.
- Being prepared for the social issues that would emerge from an LNG plant approval.

Many of these themes continued to emerge throughout the Redesign Rupert project and became framing points for the community mapping process and the Redesign Rupert Recharge community workshop.
