Course Notes

- **LIBERAL ARTS & SCIENCE REQUIREMENT:** As a condition of your admission to the program, you would have been informed in your Admissions letter of the requirement to complete additional Liberal Arts or Science coursework. All students are required to have 48 credit hours of coursework from this area. This requirement will vary depending on student background. Unsure if you need to pick up additional coursework? Please review with your Student Advisor.
- **COURSE OFFERINGS:** For students hoping to complete in 2 years, courses need to be taken in the semester offered in order to progress to the next semester. The only flexibility with regard to coursework is with regard to electives and SOCW 421. Planning on taking fewer classes? Please check with your Student Advisor.

NOTE: Although every attempt has been made to ensure the information on this worksheet is accurate, in the case of any discrepancy the Academic Calendar shall be considered the authority. This program planning worksheet is an unofficial planning tool for students new to UNBC and for students in a non-competitive entry program. Once your program has been declared, please use your degree evaluation as it is the official degree program-tracking document. - **ELECTIVES:** Electives are numbered SOCW 422 or higher as per the list in the academic calendar. SOCW 421 is **not** an elective course; students are required to complete it. Have transfer credit for SOCW 421? Please see your Student Advisor.
- **SPECIALIZATIONS:** Specialization courses will need to be planned in advance in order to ensure course availability. Some classes are typically only offered every two years. When taking a specialization, you will only have one SOCW elective remaining that is your choice (off the calendar list) as the other three 400 level electives are now specific and required depending on the specializations as outlined below. Students interested in a specialization will need to choose the following as part of their electives in addition to one other SOCW elective off the list. This fourth course is indicated by a blank below and is the student's choice from the calendar list.

Child Welfare Specialization: SOCW 422, SOCW 426, SOCW 439, SOCW 4____.

Indigenous Specialization: SOCW 455, SOCW 456, SOCW 457, SOCW 4____.

Please note, specializations and minor are listed on the transcript only and are not indicated on a student's parchment.

- **SUMMER COURSES:** The program typically offers a variety of SOCW 4XX elective courses in the May/August semester, many of which are delivered in a condensed week-long format. SOCW 421 is also often offered in the summer in an online format. For those students that need them, this semester is also a good chance to pick up any Liberal Arts or Science credits or other coursework that they had remaining upon admission to the program.
- **REPEATING COURSES:** Students may repeat a Social Work course once. Students who fail a required Social Work course twice are required to withdraw from the program.
- **QUALIFICATION FOR THE DEGREE:** Students must attain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.33 (C+) on courses for credit towards the Social Work degree. In addition, students must attain a minimum passing grade of 2.00 (C) in every Social Work course for credit towards the degree. All requirements for the degree must be completed within eight years of admission into the program or from the first Social Work course used for credit towards the degree.
