1. Moving Classes Online Fall 2020 – Asynchronous, Synchronous or Hybrid Classes

There are a few options that your instructors will potentially use to facilitate your online classes remotely this year: synchronous, asynchronous or combination of both (hybrid). Be sure to check with your course syllabus and <u>UNBC Course</u> Schedule for the format in which the course will be delivered. Delivery format for GEOGRAPHY courses are listed on the Geography Homepage (under "News" section) under <u>Fall 2020 Courses & Modes of Delivery</u>.

Synchronous: instructors and students gather at the same day/time and interact in "real time" with a very short or "near-real time" exchange between instructors and students via Blackboard Collaborate, Zoom or other means which will be determined by your instructor.



Asynchronous: Instructors prepare course materials for students in advance of students' access (often 'revealed' each week vs. all at once to ensure students are not overwhelmed!). Students may access the course materials such as pre-recorded lectures, assigned readings and class discussions at a time of their choosing. Be sure to schedule enough time each week to engage in the course content.



Mix of Synchronous & Asynchronous (otherwise known as Hybrid): Some courses will be delivered as a combination of synchronous (some meeting times/days) and asynchronous.

Student Follow-up/Action:

- Determine the <u>times</u> and <u>days</u> in which attendance is required
- Watch for instructions from your instructor regarding how to connect (virtually) to the lecture
- Ensure you have the required computer system requirements to view lecture and participate
- If you need help to sign into lecture on Blackboard check out: "Web Conferencing (Collaborate)"

2. Ensure Your UNBC Email Is Activated

Check your <u>UNBC</u> email address and ensure you are able to login. It is important to note that all instructions and communications from university will be sent to your UNBC emails, not your personal email address. See "<u>Accounts for New Students</u>" if you have not already activated your UNBC email.

- To obtain username and password information for the first time please use the <u>Account Activation</u> information sent to your personal email address
- It is important to use this email account for all communications with UNBC Staff & Faculty to enable Identity Confirmation and Identity Management

3. Check Bb Blackboard and Familiarize Yourself

Student Follow-up/Action:

- Access Blackboard via URL https://learn.unbc.ca or UNBC portal https://myu.unbc.ca
- Check that the courses you have registered for show up on your Blackboard system (note: courses will not show up until the morning of first day of classes on September 8)
- Download the Blackboard App Store' or 'Google Play'
- Questions about how to use or access different resources and tools available via Blackboard, see "A Student Guide to Learning With Technology @UNBC" (hint: You will want to check this useful resource out!)

<u>Technical Requirements for Blackboard</u>: Blackboard Learn runs on most systems on desktops, laptops, tablets, and smartphones.

Internet Connectivity: Broadband internet connection (Cable, DSL, etc.) is recommended, dial-up connections are supported.

6. Blackboard Online Classes (Collaborate):

To ensure you get the most out of your online lecture using Blackboard Collaborate:

- If available, use a hard-wired (Ethernet) connection. If not available, use a Wi-Fi connection- try to be as close to the router as possible.
- Close all programs and streaming services on your computer except for the browser you are using for your Collaborate session.
- Keep your browser current. Only use up-to-date Internet browsers that are supported by Blackboard Collaborate.

- Limit video use. Use video during the session only when necessary.
- Use supported mobile browsers. If on a mobile device, use a supported mobile browser. For the best experience, use Safari on iOS devices and Chrome on Android devices.
- Use headphones. Cut down on the background noise and use headphones.
- Disable Adblockers. Browser Adblockers can turn off your audio and video and can cause buttons to not show up.

Depending on the session and instructor there are a few ways to join your lecture:

- a. <u>Instructor will send a weblink</u>. Open the link in your browser. Blackboard Collaborate is at the top of the screen. It mentions what session you are joining and there is a place for you to type your name. Select Join Session after typing your name.
- b. From your course. Open Collaborate from inside your course. It opens in your learning management system.
- c. From the Blackboard app. You can launch sessions from the Blackboard app when links are provided in your courses.

7. Zoom Online Classes:

Anyone with a UNBC account can now sign in to Zoom using their UNBC credentials.

Sign In Steps (via Education Media Services):

- Visit the <u>UNBC Zoom site</u>
- Sign in with your UNBC account credentials to use the application and configure your account
- Join an existing meeting using a link provided by the host of your class/meeting

8. Etiquette for Online "Live" Class/Lectures:

Be aware of your surroundings -remember your instructor and classmates can also see BEHIND you.

Ensure your microphone is on Mute (and be sure to UN-mute when you speak)— once into the virtual classroom, be sure to mute your microphone to eliminate background noise that could distract others.

Raise your hand and wait to be called upon - If you wish to speak, either physically raise your hand or use the "Raise Hand" button at the center of the bottom of your screen. Once called upon, unmute yourself and begin speaking. When you have finished speaking, indicate you are done by saying something like "That's all" or "Thank you" and then mute your microphone again.

"Raising your hand" in Blackboard Collaborate with your keyboard, press Alt + H.

'Raising your hand' in Zoom:

- a. Click "Participants" on the Zoom Menu Bar. (The Zoom menu bar appears at the bottom of the Zoom window once the meeting begins. If you don't see the menu bar, move your mouse slightly and the bar will appear. The bar disappears after a few seconds when in full-screen mode.
- b. The white Participants box that appears after you do Step 1 has a **Raise Hand** command at the bottom, just click that to raise your hand.

9. Virtual Desktop (VDI) & Virtual Private Network (VPN)

VMware Virtual Desktop (VDI) allows a connection to your UNBC resources including software programs from anywhere internet connectivity is available.

Virtual Private Network (VPN) Downloading VPN extends the UNBC network through the Internet enabling users to access UNBC resources as if they are connected locally to the campus network. VPN traffic is encrypted between remote computers and the campus network in order to keep the data travelling through it private and secure. Using the UNBC VPN system have all of the benefits of locally connected computers, including access to resources such as shared drives (H: and G: drive) which are normally unavailable for access from off campus.

12. Preparing for Your Online School Experience

Characteristics of Successful Online Learners

- Create goals -online courses have deadlines so stay focused on how you will manage your weekly tasks
- Be active on online forums/class discussions post early and check back often. Try to engage your classmates
- Create group chats with your classmates to help each other with problem-solving and connection
- Take responsibility for your learning process
- Make weekly checklists

Time Management and Effective Study Environment Tips

- Plan your time! Collect all your weekly tasks and deadlines for the course in one place
- Use a weekly schedule to create a routine- having a routine takes some of the decision-making out of your day and creates a sense of normalcy during such uncertain times
- Avoid common distractions (and recognize what distracts you!)- improve your concentration and work pace by managing common distractions (pick a quiet space, put your phone away)

Working Efficiently and Effectively from Home

- Think about what was working for you and take on the parts of that routine that are still realistic to working from home
- Remember that school is still your full-time job (8-10hrs per course per week x ____courses=??)
- If possible, "attend" classes (if synchronous) -if this is not possible, work when you can, focusing on 2-3 courses each day
- Between your "classes," do homework and work on assignments (schedule it in or create a list if that helps)
- Aim to have consistent bedtimes and wake-up times
- Eat meals at regular intervals
- Get dressed and ready for the day. You can still wear comfortable clothes—just change out of your 'pjs'

Try to Create a Balance Between Work and Other Activities

- Try to recognize what time of day you are most effective and do your challenging work at that time.
- Do your work before relaxing (give yourself a reward for work completed)
- Take short, frequent breaks
- Practice self-compassion

Set-up Your Work Space

- Pick a place and create a 'work spot' (e.g. desk, table) exclusively for studying (if possible)
- During work hours at least, your work spot (e.g. desk, table) is a work-only zone
- Set a comfortable room temperature (not too warm or you will get sleepy!)
- Natural light is best if possible, as it will boost your mood and motivation
- REMOVE things you do not need (e.g. phone, turn off social media, etc.)

Supplies:

- Laptop, desktop or tablet
- Headphones or earbuds -- the biggest impediment to online communications is poor audio quality, so make sure you
 have a headset or earbuds; this is important to eliminating audio feedback loops, background noises, and other
 disruptions
- Microphone (may already be built into your device, computer, camera or as part of a separate headset)
- Webcam (may already be built into your device or computer)
- Internet this all does require reliable internet service; a wireless hotspot on a high-speed network may also suffice.

13. Contacting Your Instructors

Take the time to read your course syllabus thoroughly. You will find information about your professors' email preferences, including how frequently they will check and respond to emails. Do not hesitate to contact your instructor or TA if you have a question, but be sure to be polite and formal, unless you are invited to be informal. Think of your email as a professional document, not a text to your friend.

Email Tips:

- Begin with the purpose of your email in the subject line
- Use a proper salutation such as "Dear", "Hello" or "Good Morning/Evening"
- Identify yourself by name, course, and section.
- If you are requesting an extension or additional information about an assignment, ensure the relevant information is not already outlined in the course syllabus
- Communicate clearly and concisely. Like you, professors are busy.
- Do not expect an immediate response to your email (your instructor might not check emails at night or on weekends or holidays)
- Send it from your UNBC email address, not your personal email

14. Blackboard Features & "How to..."

Helpful hint

<u>Discussions</u> – instructors may post discussion questions, either for the entire class or in assigned groups. View this extremely detailed (2min) video "<u>Discussions in Original Course View</u>" that demonstrates the features that will help you to successfully post to discussions and remain engaged in course content!

Course Content feature is where files, assignments discussions, web links and other important course content are organized into folders, learning modules or lesson plans.

Submitting an Assignment – your instructor can add assignments to different areas of your course, including from a link on the course menu called "Assignments." Assignments might also be incorporate assignments into each week's content.
