### **Course description and objectives:**

This course will build upon the topics and conceptual approach covered in human geography field school (GEOG-333). Students will use this foundation to experience first hand the varieties of human transformations of landscapes in Nevada and California. Based on readings, class discussion and observations and experiences from the field, students will prepare a major paper on an improved topic dealing with any aspect of political ecology relating to the sites visited.

### **Prerequisites:**

+Minimum 30 credits of lower division study, of which at least 3 credits are human geography courses (e.g., GEOG 101, 102, 200, 202, 203, etc.), or by permission of the instructor

++Minimum 60 credits of lower division study, of which at least 6 credits are human geography courses (e.g., GEOG 101, 102, 200, 202, 203, etc.), or by permission of the instructor

### **Textbook:**

There is no required textbook for this course.

### **Grading:**

Grading for this course consists of the following components:

- 10% Initial proposal (due May 1)
- 10% Presentation of final proposal (due May 13)
- 25% Preliminary literature review (due by July 1)
- 50% Final paper submission (due August 31)
