Paul Koke MA International Studies, Global Environmental Policy, 2008/2009

Paul Koke completed his MA in the International Studies, Global Environmental Policy program at UNBC in November 2008. His major research work focuses on environmental impact assessment processes, and the socio-economic and environmental impacts related to large-scale mineral development projects in northern Canada and Alaska. Immediately following completion of his MA, he taught the NORS 101 course-"Introduction to the Circumpolar North".

His experience studying in Northern BC has influenced Paul to begin his professional career in the North. He recently accepted a technical and environmental planning position with a consulting firm, based in Yellowknife, Northwest Territories. He has been working primarily in environmental management, as well as community and development planning. Much of the work has involved socioeconomic research and community consultation in First Nations communities throughout the NWT. The position has entailed considerable travel in the region, including recent visits to several small (approx. 100 people) fly-in only communities, such as Trout Lake, NT to meet with local First Nations and discuss economic development projects.

* Canada's Relationship with Inuit: A History of Policy and Program Development

The Research and Analysis Directorate of Indian and Northern Affairs Canada, in conjunction with the Inuit Relations Secretariat, have published a book on Canada's relationship with Inuit. This book provides an overview of the Federal Government's Inuit policy and program development from first contact to 2006. Topics that are covered include the 1939 *Re Eskimo* decision that gave Canada constitutional responsibility for Inuit, post World War II acculturation and defence projects, law and justice, sovereignty and relocations, the Enumber identification system, Inuit political organizations, comprehensive claim agreements, housing, healthcare, education, economic development, self-government, the environment, and urban issues.

* The 6th ArcticNet Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM2009) will be held from December 8-11, 2009 at the Fairmont Empress Hotel and adjoining Victoria Conference Centre in Victoria, British-Columbia.

The ASM is the major ArcticNet networking event of the year and the largest annual Arctic science meeting in Canada. All ArcticNet Network Investigators (NIs) are expected to attend the meeting and to encourage their student's participation.
