¹ Transfer credit is based on students taken all of the recommended course work noted above.

² Students are required to complete a minimum of 48 credit hours of liberal arts and sciences coursework. This breakdown is based on Accreditation and is necessary to obtain a Bachelor of Social Work Degree from UNBC.

[^]This symbol indicates that this course will be counted towards the Liberal Arts & Science credit – 6 courses total and 18 credits. Depending on what students choose to take in their 1st & 2nd Semester elective, one more course could be added for a total of 7 courses and 21 credits. Please see note 2 above under the CNC requirements for the completion of the diploma.

Please note: Completing this diploma will result in being 27 credits short of the Liberal Arts & Sciences admission requirement for UNBC. 21 of these credits will need to be completed prior to you applying for admission to the UNBC Bachelor of Social Work program. The remainder of the credits (6) can be completed while you are working on your UNBC Bachelor of Social Work Degree, these credits **must** be completed before you will be eligible to graduate from UNBC.

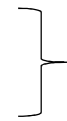
